

# Do you take medicine for Type 2 Diabetes?

## Did you know:



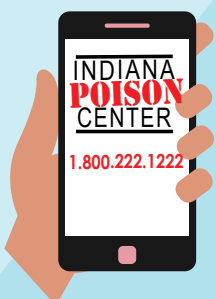
- **Just ONE pill can be very dangerous.** Any amount of diabetes medication can be dangerous to a child or adult who doesn't usually take it.
- **Just one pill can make blood sugar drop very low.** Symptoms of low blood sugar include drowsiness, trouble talking or walking, clammy skin, vomiting, and seizures.
- **Call IPC as soon as you find out the medication has been taken.** Symptoms may not start for up to 24 hours and may last for several days.

- Always keep medicines in the original bottle, with prescription label and CRC (child-resistant cap).



- Never mix different medicines in the same bottle.

- Never put medicines in an unsecured container (Ex. a plastic sandwich bag, bowl, cup, or pill minder).
